

FCSSANZ ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA CHANGES

The <u>FCSSANZ</u> eligibility criteria has now been modernised to ensure recognition of Members' professional work and/or achievements in colorectal surgery and to reflect the diversity in our profession.

There are 3 pathways:

- 1. FCSSANZ Professional Excellence
- 2. FCSSANZ Honorary
- 3. FCSSANZ Recertification

All pathways must meet the general eligibility criteria, plus the specific pathway eligibility criteria. Full details of the pathway eligibility criteria can be found on the CSSANZ website.

FCSSANZ GENERAL ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

All pathways must meet the general eligibility criteria, plus the specific pathway eligibility criteria.

To be eligible to become an FCSSANZ, the member must meet all of the following requirements:

- 1. Be a current financial CSSANZ Member and have maintained continuous membership for a minimum of ten years; and
- 2. Must be a current Fellow of RACS, full financial and compliant with CPD; and
- 3. Must not have had their membership of CSSANZ or their Fellowship of RACS suspended or terminated; and
- 4. Should not have restrictions or conditions placed on their practice by the Medical Board of Australia or the New Zealand Medical Council or any other regulatory authority; and
- 5. Scope of practice has not been limited or credentialing restricted as a sanction or disciplinary action by any hospital where they practise or have practised within the last five years; and
- 6. Be of good ethical and professional standing – as defined by AHPRA Good medical practice: a code of conduct for doctors in Australia, and MCNZ: Good Medical Practice in New Zealand.

Members of Mention Vale Russell Stitz

Dr Stitz was a giant of the colorectal world and will be remembered fondly by the many aspirant surgeons he inspired. His influence on the Royal Brisbane and indeed Australian colorectal surgery cannot be overstated. His strong work and service ethic set the standard and his willingness to learn and evolve placed Brisbane squarely at the centre of the laparoscopic colorectal surgery revolution.

An alumnus of Ipswich Grammar in the class of 1960, Dr Stitz graduated from medicine in 1966 and in addition to his academic achievements, distinguished himself on the field in Rugby. Dr Stitz completed his training at the Royal Brisbane Hospital and then extended his experience in the developing sub-speciality of colorectal surgery in the United Kingdom and made lifelong friendships with his mentors at St Mark's in London.

Having completed the first Australian laparoscopic colectomy in 1991, the scene was set for the wider application and uptake of this technique throughout Australia and New Zealand. The first laparoscopic colorectal surgery courses commenced in 2001 and continue to this day.

His executive leadership was extraordinary and evidenced by the great number of positions he held, from President of the Colorectal Surgical Society of Australasia (now the CSSANZ), President of the Qld branch of the AMA, President of the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons to Commissioner of the HQCC. Indeed, he was a founding member of the CSSA and would be very happy with how the society has grown and developed over the years.



In parallel, he enjoyed a career in the army reserve, attaining a rank of Colonel. He felt that his army career synergised with clinical leadership and further equipped him with the skills that exemplified the performance of his executive roles.

His fellows will attest that he spent many hours at the Wesley Hospital but always managed to give his patients and colleagues as much time as they needed. He generously gave advice freely to the many surgeons who sought his help and experience. The Wesley Hospital recognised his many years of service by naming the new operating theatre wing after him.

His passion for education was realised when he was appointed as the professor of Surgery at the University of Queensland. This was a challenge he pursued with his trademark enthusiasm and his collaborative spirit brought his colleagues together to invigorate the surgical teaching program.

Even following his retirement, he continued the theme of community service and philanthropy and headed the Buderim Foundation. He enjoyed attending BBQs in Brisbane to meet his old colleagues and the new generation of colorectal fellows.

Russell was a great statesman, and his legacy is writ large, but moreover, he was compassionate, he listened to people and advised them with his wealth of experience. His humanity set him apart. He was inspirational, he was a leader, he was, importantly, a friend.

Russell will be dearly missed by all those whose lives he touched and particularly by his wife, Anne, his daughters, Claire and Kate, and his son William.

Members of Mention Life Member - Michael Solomon

Professor Michael Solomon was awarded Life Membership of the CSSANZ at the 2023 AGM. He has made substantial contributions to both the Society and the field of colorectal surgery in Australia and New Zealand throughout his distinguished career. Currently serving as a consultant surgeon and academic head of department at RPA Hospital, Professor Solomon holds the esteemed position of Professor of Surgical Research at the University of Sydney. His extensive involvement with CSSANZ includes past roles as President and Chairman of the TBCRS, reflecting his leadership and commitment to advancing colorectal surgery.

Michael's impact on CSSANZ is noteworthy. His journey with the organization began in 1996 when he was elected to the CSSANZ Council. As the inaugural member of the CSSANZ research committee, he assumed the role of chairman until 2004. Notably, Michael played a pivotal role in the establishment of the TBCRS in 1996, dedicating 12 years to its evolution, including a six-year term as Chairman (2002 – 2007). His executive roles on the CSSANZ Council, culminating in the presidency from 2002 to 2004, reflect his dedication and influence within the organization.

Michael's key achievement during his presidency was facilitating the first Memorandum of Understanding between CSSANZ and RACS, solidifying CSSANZ's representation of colorectal surgery in Australia and New Zealand.

In addition to his organizational contributions, Michael has a prolific academic record. With over 400 peer-reviewed papers, multiple book chapters, and 15 international named lectures, he has made a significant impact on surgical clinical research.



Having supervised over 50 higher degree students, he holds the highest research doctorate degrees from the National University of Ireland (DMed) and the University of Sydney (DMedSc). Currently, as Chairman of the Institute of Academic Surgery at RPA and head of the Surgical Outcomes Research Centre at the University of Sydney, he focuses on evidence-based surgical research, clinical trials, and mentoring young academic surgeons.

Michael's outstanding achievements have garnered numerous prestigious awards, including the Ruthven Blackburn Medal for Clinical Research in 2022, the RPA Research Foundation Medal and Prize for Excellence and Outstanding Achievements in Medical Research in 2014, and the Abraham Colles Medal from the Royal College of Surgeons of Ireland in 2013, among others. Internationally recognized for his significant contributions to the evolution of Pelvic Exenteration surgery.

Locally, he serves as the Program Director of Advanced Gastrointestinal Surgery at RPA Hospital. In this capacity, he oversees national and statewide referral services, contributing to the establishment of advanced malignancy surgical services in colorectal units across Australia and New Zealand.



CR-23 GOLD COAST - NOVEMBER 2023 MARK DOUDLE | CR23 MEETING CONVENOR

The CR23 Meeting has been described as the "best ever"!

This was held at the JW Marriott on the Gold Coast between Nov 17/18th. There were 325 registered attendees arguably a near record.

The meeting was headed by 2 international and one local visitor. Dr Sharon Stein from Cleveland USA, was entertaining and insightful in her keynote Medtronic lecture dealing with leadership and diversity in surgery.

Professor Jurriaan Tuynman from the Netherlands asked us to consider focusing internally on quality assessment, training and standardization in our management of right colon cancer in his ESR Hughes Oration.

Professor Tarik Sammour from Adelaide gave the CSSANZ Oration which discussed the management of rectal cancer, past, present and the future.

Other speakers included a mix of local nonsurgeons helping us to broaden our knowledge of cancer, IBD and the gynecological management of problems that cross the specialist divide. The standout speaker was Jon Barnard from New Zealand who in his presentation regarding the risks and benefits of loop ileostomy linked the theme with Al generated grand master painters and the concept of squeezing the juice of a orange! Truly entertaining but also engaging. This was almost matched with the concept of "chickens and cowboys" for taking risks with anastomotic leaks. These themes were then emulated by subsequent later speakers, adjusting their presentations to carry these messages in a stunningly witty way to continue to engage the audience. Sessions were well attended with even the last session discussing a mixture of proctology issues being well received.

The trade supported the meeting enthusatically with our Principle Partner Medtronic leading the way. Our meeting dinner was to be held by the pool but the weather necessitated the venue to change to indoors however some still dressed appropriately in the "coastal chic" theme. Despite this change, this was a great opportunity to mix with colleagues and socialize in an informal way.

Overall, the meeting was a great success with current colorectal surgical issues ably discussed in a great setting with support from industry. The presentations were all of excellent quality which were all enthusiastically embraced by those who attended.

I recently attended the combined meeting of the Asia Pacific Foundation of Coloproctology combined, Asian Society of Stoma Rehabilitation and Asia and South Pacific Ostomy Association in Singapore. The meeting theme was when East meets West- furthering Colorectal's best. I was fortune to one of the more than 50 invited speakers from around the world invited to take part in the meeting. Notable speakers included Connor Delany from the Cleveland Clinic USA, Ismail Gogenur from Denmark, Charles Maxwell-Armstrong from the UK, Christianne Buskens from the Netherlands, and April Roslani from Malaysia to name just a few.

The meeting started with a day's workshop then two days of lectures and discussions that addressed the usual issues around the management of colorectal cancer, inflammatory bowel disease and proctology. The meeting contrasted the approach taken by the western surgeons with that of the Asian surgeons. The varied cultural, societal and economic factors impacted on the management of patients was highlighted in some presentations, as was the success and fantastic outcomes achieved from the low income Asian countries . ESCP | VILNIUS, LITHUANIA - 3 - 6 SEPTEMBER 2023 EDWARD COOPER | MEDTRONIC TRAVELLING FELLOWSHIP

Earlier this year I attended the 18th Scientific Conference of the European Society of Coloproctology in Vilnius, Lithuania with the generous support provided by CSSANZ and Medtronic via the Travel Fellowship Grant.

The grant provided me the opportunity to attend and deliver a presentation on research which I carried out during my time with the colorectal unit at the Oxford University Hospitals. The presentation focused on the use of national hospital episode statistics (HES) data to determine the incidence and demographics of rectal prolapse in patients with inherited connective tissue disorders.

ESCP | VILNIUS, LITHUANIA- 3-6 SEPTEMBER 2023 PETER POCKNEY



I attended the European Society of Coloproctology meeting in Vilnius, Lithuania, in late September. The weather was glorious, the city beautiful and interesting, and the hosts delightful.

As always with the ESCP, the meeting is high quality, low fuss, heavily evidence oriented and has minimal "I do it this way, so that is the best" content.

The ESCP sponsors and directs a wide variety of research, often using collaborative methods to widen participation and improve the generalisability of the output. That program is now mature, so there are multiple sessions aimed at reporting studies that have recently completed, reporting progress on studies underway, launching developed and funded trials and cohort studies, and more where new ideas are presented, critiqued and refined.

It is almost exclusively presented in English, despite probably fewer than 10% of the attendees being native English speakers. The range of countries involved, presenters invited, and the diversity of those presenters keeps growing. It is a meeting where it is easy to meet new colleagues, get new ideas, hear new evidence, learn about and be taught to do new techniques, and to see and contribute to new evidence being generated.

ANZTBCRS RESEARCH FELLOW THUY-MY NGUYEN

During my ANZTBCRS Research year, I had the privilege of collaborating with the Royal Adelaide Hospital's (RAH) Colorectal Research Group, working alongside Dr. Michelle Thomas and A/Prof. Tarik Sammour. With my interest in pelvic floor pathology, I conducted patient questionnaires aimed at developing a nurse-led remote management algorithm for Low Anterior Resection Syndrome. Furthermore, as the RAH was an early adopter of total neoadjuvant therapy for the management of rectal cancer, I had the distinct opportunity to compare the quality of life among post-TNT watch-and-wait patients to those treated conventionally with or without chemoradiotherapy.

Simultaneously, I dedicated this period to completing the final leg of my Masters of Surgical Education. My thesis delved into curricular aspects of robotic colorectal surgery, enriching my capacity as a discerning learner and, hopefully, a more effective educator.

Adding to this significant year, I embarked on a personal milestone—motherhood. The attached photo captures my 9-month-old son, Khoi, and I at the Unko (Poo) Museum in Odaiba, Tokyo.

I would like to thank my supervisors and research team at the RAH for making this past year immensely fulfilling. In addition, I am grateful for the support provided by the ANZTBCRS Medtronic Research Fellowship and the RACS Pickard Robotic Training Grant.

SURGERY IN SUVA ASIRI ARACHCHI

It was a pleasure to visit Colonial War Memorial (CWM) Hospital in Suva Fiji this year. In 2022, I first visited CWM hospital with two New Zealand Surgeons while I was working as a fellow at North Shore Hospital in Auckland. This year we made a separate visit with our team at Austin Health in Melbourne, and a colleague from Tauranga hospital in New Zealand. The aim of the trip this year was to promote Colorectal Surgery in Fiji, with an emphasis on teaching and education of surgical registrars, surgeons and nurses as well as assisting the local surgeons with complex colorectal cases.

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the inauguration of CWM hospital. CWM hospital is the largest of two public hospitals on the main island of Fiji that serve a country of almost one million people. Dr Illiatu Delasau and Dr Tim Qereqeretabua are the two general surgeons at the general surgical department and perform all general surgical operations including bowel resections, pancreatectomy, abdominal aortic aneurysm repairs and amputations. It is truly remarkable to see the sheer work these surgeons perform to serve a community in need.

Although the hospital serves such a high needs population, the resources at the CWM hospital are extremely scarce. Ranging from a lack of simple wound dressings, stoma bags, sterile gowns and surgical count boards to surgical equipment, gastrointestinal staplers and vascular grafts. The hospital rely heavily on equipment that is donated by overseas visiting teams. We observed that the hospital only had two St Marks retractors both of which were donated by Nelson Hospital in New Zealand. This year we donated upwards of \$20,000 worth of equipment to CWM hospital including surgical staplers, vascular grafts, orthopaedic screws, rigid sigmoidoscopy, stoma bags, urinary catheters and LigaSure devices. We are grateful for Austin health and Monash health for their kind donations of surgical equipment which will be a vital resource for the hospital.

Our visit this year we had a big emphasis on education and training. Not only for the surgical registrars but also nursing staff, we held several teaching sessions. This included education about colorectal cancer, marking of stoma bags, bedside teaching and final exam preparation tips. We gave local trainee registrars opportunity to

participate in several colorectal surgical cases in order to provide feedback and critique on surgical skills and teach new techniques relevant to colorectal surgery. We were also able to establish a collaboration with the Fijian surgical association and bring one of their local surgeons to Ballarat for a thoracic fellowship with the aim to return to Fiji to help train their future surgeons. We hope to strengthen this connection in order to continue this tradition moving forward.

There were several colorectal cases which we assisted the local surgeons with. This included a Hartmann's for an acute large bowel obstruction from sigmoid cancer, ultralow anterior resection for a low rectal cancer, Hartmann's reversal and revision of a prolapsed colostomy. These cases proved more difficult without the abundance of equipment that is available to us back home. For example, the lack of a TA stapler meant that we had to perform a handsewn double layer purstring of the rectal stump in an ultra-low anterior resection in a male pelvis. These cases also provided an opportunity to teach surgical registrars and local surgeons.

We would like to thank the chief surgeons at CWM hospital Dr Illiatu Delasau and Dr Tim Qereqeretabua for their exceptional hospitality during our stay in Suva. Despite the challenges the that they faced, we were welcomed with open arms and warm smiles creating an environment of camaraderie and shared purpose. Our experience at CWM Hospital has solidified our commitment to strengthening the connection with this esteemed institution. As we reflect on our time in Fiji, we are already eagerly anticipating future visits to Fiji and other Pacific islands, where we can continue to collaborate with communities in need.



Research is just formalised curiosity


If you know exactly what you're doing professionally all the time and are not curious about how to improve what you're doing then clearly research is not for you!

For the rest of us it is integral to the profession of colorectal surgery. The fact that so many of us profess to similar curiosities synchronously is the rationale for a collaborative approach to surgical research. It is why many of us believe we should look into investigating:

- The best way to form an anastomosis following ileo-colic resection for Crohns
- How to quantify and record the complexity of surgery following TNT chemoradiotherapy
- Whether pre-operative oral antibiotics actually decrease anastomotic leak rates

Additionally the RSC has felt a certain amount of survey 'fatigue' with members. In light of this at the most recent council meeting it was decided to reduce the frequency of surveys by one, down to four surveys annually.

Please do your best to participate in these surveys; they are only as good as the number of participants and provide many avenues for current and future research.


